What does it mean to be tested by fire?

During this past week there has been many sad and disturbing events - both locally and abroad that surely stirred many of our hearts with sadness and deep thought. Even Speaking to families, friends and fellow congregation members, it is apparent that each of us, in some way or another have hardship, concerns, sorrow or pain.

I read once that if we all were to gift wrap our troubles and throw it into the air, you would prefer to catch your own.

As these somber thoughts have captivated my thoughts this week, 1 Peter 1:7 stirred my heart and captivated my thoughts.

In <u>1 Peter 1:3-12</u>, the apostle Peter delivers an uplifting sermon about our salvation in Jesus Christ. Peter wants his audience to understand the importance of <u>faith</u>. He says that faith is "tested by fire" (verse 7, NKJV) in order to prove its genuineness.

In the same context, Peter says that, through faith, God protects us by His power until we receive the fullness of salvation and our <u>eternal inheritance</u> (verse 5). This "priceless inheritance" is secure and "beyond the reach of change or decay" (verse 4, NLT). We can rejoice, knowing that joy awaits us, explained Peter. But in the meantime, we "must endure many trials" (verse 6, NLT).

The believer's faith is "tested by fire" through trials for a specific purpose: "These trials will show that your faith is genuine. It is being tested as fire tests and purifies gold—though your faith is far more precious than mere gold. So when your faith remains strong through many trials, it will bring you much praise and glory and honor on the day when Jesus Christ is revealed to the whole world" (1 Peter 1:7, NLT). Peter asserts that trials serve to authenticate our faith by deepening it and strengthening our commitment to Jesus.

Testing by fire is part of the metalworker's process to determine the quality of metal and remove all impurities. A goldsmith or silversmith must repeatedly heat the raw metals to extremely high temperatures until they melt. The contaminants rise to the surface in this liquid state and are skimmed off. Only after this refining process of separating the precious elements from the dross can a pure, valuable, and useful object be formed.

The Bible contains many references to God as the refiner who tests His people's hearts in the fire of adversity. When Peter penned his message, he may have had the suffering of Job in mind. Amid his horrendous ordeal, Job said of God by faith, "He knows where I am going. And when he tests me, I will come out as pure as gold" (Job 23:10, NLT).

Through the prophet Isaiah, God spoke to the remnant of Israel, "I have refined you, but not as silver is refined. Rather, I have refined you in the furnace of suffering" (Isaiah 48:10, NLT). To an end-times group of Jewish survivors, the Lord declared His purpose again: "I will bring that group through the fire and make them pure. I will refine them like silver and purify them like gold. They will call on my name, and I will answer them. I will say, 'These are my people,' and they will say, 'The Lord is our God'" (Zechariah 13:9, NLT).

The Bible tells believers to live with the expectation of being tested by fire. If we are prepared to experience troubles in life, we won't be so shaken when they come. Solomon observed with matter-of-factness, "Fire tests the purity of silver and gold, but the Lord tests the heart" (Proverbs 17:3, NLT). The psalmist affirmed, "For you, God, tested us; you refined us like silver" (Psalm 66:10).

If you find yourself asking, "Why God? Why are You allowing this suffering?"

Remember this:

being tested by fire will make you stronger and purer in faith as you remain steadfast through hardship. We can have hope and courage in the face of adversity if we understand that, through it all, God is working His purposes for our good (Romans 8:28). James held that a Christian who perseveres under trial is blessed "because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him" (James 1:12).

Faith that stays true through every fiery test is more valuable than the finest, purest gold.

Please pray for the church in Nigeria.

More than 7,000 Nigerian Christians have been murdered in the first 220 days of this year. That's an average of 32 for every day of the year, so far. The killers have been terrorists from Islamic extremist groups and radicalised Fulani herder Muslim militias.

Nearly 8,000 Christians were violently seized and kidnapped by the same groups – usually for ransom. All this data has been verified by the Nigerian-based International Society for Civil Liberties and Rule of Law (Intersociety). It is run by Christian criminologist and researcher Emeka Umeagbalasi. The organisation relies on what it deems to be credible local and foreign media reports, government accounts, reports from international rights groups and eyewitness accounts to compile the data.

It estimates tens of thousands of Nigerian Christians have been murdered in the last decade. Intersociety reports that "185,009 defenceless Nigerians" have been killed since 2009, including 125,009 Christians and 60,000 liberal Muslims.

Its data indicates 19,100 churches were razed during the same period when more than 1,100 Christian communities were pillaged and 600 Christian clerics abducted, including 250 Catholic priests and 350 pastors. Tens of thousands, perhaps hundreds of thousands, more people have been displaced amid the rise of Islamic extremist groups like Boko Haram and Islamic State-affiliated extremists in the northeast of the country.

Intersociety also claims that Nigeria is providing a "safe haven" to at least 22 Islamic terror groups, several of which reportedly have links to Islamic State and the World Jihad Fund. The organisation began tracking violence against Christians and religious intolerance in Nigeria in 2010. "We have been following the patterns and trends, and the situation is getting worse," Mr. Umeagbalasi told The Christian Post. Human rights advocates continue to criticise the Nigerian government's inability to protect Christians. Persecution watchdog Open Doors reports that more than 16 million Christians have been driven from their homes across Africa in the past decade.

Henrietta Blyth, CEO of Open Doors UK, said: "We need justice, restoration, and protection for these communities. The world must wake up to this crisis." Nigerian youth leader D'Young Mangut said: "People are being killed like chickens, and nothing is being done." Mr. Umeagbalasi believes the Nigerian government is culpable, telling The Christian Post that it has not apprehended the perpetrators for many of the mass killings. He condemned the government for arresting victims of Fulani militias who attempted to defend themselves.

"For over a decade, atrocities against civilians in Nigeria have been downplayed or minimised," according to Intersociety's 136-page report. It said Islamic groups are working in concert to eradicate Christianity and indigenous cultural traditions across Nigeria, with the long-term goal of imposing a caliphate or sultanate in which political authority and religious leadership are fused under Islamic law.

There is precedent for such a model.

The Sokoto Caliphate was established in 1804. At its height, it controlled most of what is now northern Nigeria and parts of neighbouring countries, enforcing Islamic Sharia law and governing through a network of emirs. The British dismantled the caliphate's sovereign authority in 1903, but its religious and cultural influence endures to this day. The White House has this month pledged to take action following the wave of brutal attacks on Christians in Nigeria, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Mozambique.

A spokesperson said: "The Trump administration condemns this horrific violence against Christians." A US State Department official added: "Religious freedom is a moral and national security imperative." Addressing how the United States and other Western governments can address the issue, Mr. Umeagbalasi said the US State Department must include Nigeria on its Countries of Particular Concern (CPC) list. It carries with it the possibility of sanctions and other deterrent measures. Nigeria was on the CPC list during President Trump's first term, but the Biden administration removed it.

A great many things have been happening at RTC over the last couple of months.

Board had just taken to accept an offer to sell the RTC Waurn Ponds campus as part of a strategy agreed in late 2024 to consolidate more of RTC's teaching, academic and administrative activities into the Melbourne CBD.

The background to that move is outlined in the letter, and a copy is attached for your information. We would be grateful if you would make that news widely known in your congregation, and to join with us in both public and private prayer for the Lord's leading and blessing on the further decisions to be taken and the considerable workload which RTC now faces over the next 6-12 months. You may also be aware that RTC Support Services General Manager, Chris

Bongers, has been unwell and unable to fully manage his role for some time, and in May Chris decided to resign from the position. Please pray for Chris and his family for both the recovery of his health and for God's leading in their decisions for the future. In the light of Chris's departure we have decided to change and simplify the RTC organisation structure, and we are currently in the process of recruiting a new RTC Business Manager. We have engaged a professional Executive Search Consultant to assist us in this process, and are now assessing a short list of potential candidates, but we'd also welcome adding to the short list if you are aware of anyone in your congregation with relevant business skills who may be interested in and available for such an assignment. Attached is a brief Position Description on the new Business Manager role.

Finally, a vacancy will also soon become available at RTC for a Finance
Administrator, and we would be very keen to recruit someone from within
RTC's network of supporting churches to fill that role. A very brief

RTC is at present relocating much of its activity from Waurn Ponds (Geelong) into the Melbourne CBD, and a position has become available for an experienced bookkeeper and finance administrator to work part time in RTC's Melbourne-based Business Support team.

Responsibilities of the role, using Xero accounts systems, include:

- Accounts receivable, including billings, account administration & collections
- Accounts payable
- Payroll processing and administration
- Bank and General Ledger reconciliations
- Monthly financial reporting to Trial Balance level

The position is for 2 or 3 days per week, and will report to the RTC Business Manager.

There is flexibility in work hours and work location - at RTC's Melbourne campus at least one day per week with further work arrangements, including WFH, negotiable.

After a short probationary period, the role will be a permanent part time position under the Educational Services (Post-Secondary Education) Award.

There is scope for the right person to grow their skills, and to grow the job, to include a greater role in financial and operational performance reporting and/or HR administration.

As well as using your sound financial and administrative skills, as Finance Administrator you will be a member of a team of Christians who are dedicated to the work of RTC in training men and women for gospel ministries in churches and Christian organisations throughout Australia and New Zealand. If that doesn't excite you, this position would not suit you at all. But if it does, you will find yourself surrounded by RTC's faculty, staff and students who are learning together and living out their Christian faith in a vibrant Christian environment.
