#### Blessed Are Those Who Wrestle

I was sitting with a friend who felt discouraged by life's ongoing struggles. She remarked about a particular family she knows—a family in a season of health, financial stability, and children who are all walking with the Lord.

"They are so blessed by God," she said, almost wistfully.

Her response made me pause. Does God's blessing always look like an easy, struggle-free life? If so, what does that mean for those in seasons of great suffering and hardship?

The Bible doesn't shy away from stories of wrestling, of tension, of people who refuse to let go of God even when their circumstances seem unbearable. Sometimes, profound encounters with God come during seasons of restoration and ease. Other times, these encounters happen when wrestling with him, and the battle doesn't mean we're any less blessed.

#### God Is in the Struggle

Like my friend, many wonder where God is in the struggle. But Scripture reminds us that some of the most defining moments in faith happen in the wrestling. In Genesis 32, we encounter the powerful story of Jacob, whose life was marked by conflict, deceit, and struggle.

The pivotal moment of Jacob's life occurs at the Jabbok River, where he has a strange and mysterious encounter with God. Jacob is alone, fearful, and preparing to face his estranged brother Esau after years of tension and deceit. But what happens next is unexpected: Jacob wrestles until dawn with a mysterious figure, later revealed to be God himself. The story continues:

When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he touched his hip socket, and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, "Let me go, for the day has broken." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." (vv. 25-26, 29)

This moment of intense physical struggle is no simple encounter; it's an intimate and transformative battle with God. Jacob doesn't come to God in passive submission. He fights. He clings. He refuses to let go. Wrestling with God isn't an act of defiance but of desperation—a fight to hold on to the very One we cannot live without.

#### Struggle Shapes Us

Jacob's struggle reminds us that a deep encounter with God often comes at a cost. It's one thing to question God out of bitterness, demanding answers from a distance. It's another entirely to wrestle with him—to bring our doubts, fears, and frustrations into his presence and refuse to walk away. This kind of engagement isn't easy. It requires vulnerability, perseverance, and the willingness to be changed.

Even Jesus wrestled in the Father's presence. In the garden of Gethsemane, he cried out, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done" (Luke 22:42, NIV). Jesus didn't avoid the struggle—he entered into it fully. Wrestling with God isn't a mark of weak faith; it's the essence of real faith that's unafraid to engage deeply with the One who holds all things.

Make no mistake—wrestling can leave a mark. Jacob leaves his encounter with God permanently changed. His hip is wounded, and he walks with a limp for the rest of his life. For us, the struggle may not result in a physical wound, but an encounter with God rarely leaves us unchanged. Wrestling with God may require surrendering a cherished dream, taking a risk in faith, or enduring a season of uncertainty. The struggle shapes us, leaving scars that tell the story of transformation.

#### Don't Settle for Distant Faith

If you're wrestling with God, don't despair. Jacob's story reminds us that the wrestling itself isn't a sign of weak faith—it's the mark of a faith that refuses to let go. Lean into the struggle not to prove your strength but to discover God's. Bring your doubts, your anger, your fears before him. He isn't afraid of them. In the wrestling, we don't push God away; we press into him more deeply than we ever have before.

The struggle shapes us, leaving scars that tell the story of transformation.

Don't settle for a distant faith that avoids hard questions. Don't be afraid to hold on, even when you don't have all the answers. The greatest growth often happens in the wrestling, not in the resolution.

And if you walk away with a limp, take heart-because that limp is the mark of someone who has encountered God and been forever changed.


An Organic Fruit and Veggie co op runs from our church hall every second Thursday. You are welcome to stop by to purchase fresh fruits and veggies.

Please pray for our persecuted brothers and sisters in Africa.

The World Evangelical Alliance (WEA) General Assembly turned its attention to one of the most sobering realities facing the global Church, as Joshua Williams, a representative of Open Doors International, issued an urgent appeal for prayer, repentance and solidarity with persecuted Christians around the world. Williams, who serves as director of Africa Services for Open Doors, shared heart-wrenching testimonies of believers enduring violence and displacement in regions where faith in Christ comes at a devastating cost. Referring to an earlier panel on the specific impact of persecution on women, he recounted the experiences of women and girls who have been subjected to repeated violence in conflict regions. "It is horror and hell," he said. "When a village or a family attacks these girls and women and keeps them, rapes them again and again and again, what these women and ladies go through cannot even be imagined."

Williams said such survivors often return home facing rejection. "Then talk about stigma," he said. "Then these girls come back, and they have Boko Haram babies, and then those children grow up as Boko Haram babies." "But I also want to say these women and ladies, they deserve our highest respect. They are warriors of the faith." He said that persecution and conflict are widespread. "This is not happening somewhere in the corner," he said. "It's happening from Somalia right across to the western coast of Africa and in Asia and in many, many countries." Williams called attention to global statistics. "Thirty-five of the conflicts are in Africa," he said, referring to data from 2024. "That is out of the 121 conflicts recorded in 2024 alone. Globally, more than 55 countries are affected. In Africa alone, there are more than 45 million displaced people." He added that "globally, 2024, almost 21 million displaced people" were recorded, emphasizing that while the world focuses on conflicts such as Gaza and Ukraine, "there are more than 121 global crises."

Out of the African conflicts he said, "Of 45 million displaced people – 16 million are Christians. Sixteen million of our brothers and sisters live in the most horrific realities, and the biggest percentage are women and girls, and young ones." Williams referred to the story of Cain and Abel to illustrate accountability before God. "When Abel was murdered by his brother, God came to ask accountability for the life of Abel," he said. "'Where is your brother Abel? His blood is crying to me." He connected this with present-day suffering, saying, "The blood of hundreds of thousands is crying to God globally. And one wonders, where is the Church? Where are the people of God?" He said the proper response begins with repentance. "When Nehemiah heard the state of the nation of Israel, of his time in Jerusalem, he broke down before God," Williams said. "He went into the state of repentance and he confessed. He cried to God. He confessed the sin of his family, confessed the sin of his people, his community, and his nation. And so did the man of God Ezra."

Quoting Ezra 9, he said, "When he heard the news of the unfaithfulness of God's people, he tore his clothes, he bathed himself before God, he was broken. And when he started praying, he prayed this prayer in Israel. He said, 'I'm too ashamed to lift my head to you. Our sins are higher than our heads.'" "I am praying for a revival of repentance in the church and in our nations," Williams said. "This one will not go out except by prayer and fasting." He added that churches in Africa, together with partners such as Open Doors, had begun an initiative called Africa, Arise, which calls believers to pray for Christians suffering persecution. "There is a call to the people of God globally and Africa and everywhere to rise up to pray for our brothers and sisters, not only in Africa but in 55-plus nations of the globe," he said. "Not to speak about it, bury it under the cushion, not talk about it as if it'll go away by itself." Despite the stark reality, Williams concluded on a hopeful note by quoting the words of Jesus in Matthew 16:18. "Despite all these challenges," he said, "I will build my Church. Praise the Lord!"

- Paul calls marriage a mystery pointing to Christ and the Church (v 32). How does that truth comfort singles and widowed believers? What does it teach every believer about our ultimate marriage to Christ?


